New Jersey Historical Commission CAPES Grant Awarded to NJSM

The New Jersey Historical Commission has awarded a CAPES (Caucus Archival Projects Evaluation Service) grant to the New Jersey Scout Museum. This grant is sponsored the New Jersey caucus of MARAC, a professional organization for archivists. The grant covers the cost of having the museum's archival collection (including paper records, photographs, and scrapbooks) evaluated by a professional archivist. Fred Pachman was instrumental in helping us to obtain the grant, which was announced in early 2005.

Mrs. Elsalyn Palmisano visited the museum and spoke with us about how the museum got started and what we are currently doing to maintain our collection. She inspected the exhibit and storage areas. She then put together a detailed report with a number of recommendations for improvements to our facility and procedures. Some of the recommendations have already been implemented. An additional benefit of this evaluation is that it can be the first step towards applying for additional grants from the State to offset the cost of implementing the recommendations.

Museum Trustees Organized

Along with obvious tasks like developing the displays at the museum and inventorying donations, another critical aspect of getting the museum started is to formally charter our organization. With Jan Wouter's assistance, a Certificate of Incorporation was filed with the state. The Board of Trustees has begun meeting, and approved the museum Bylaws. The board is now working to obtain 501(c)(3) status with the IRS for beneficial tax treatment. The President is Steve Lang. The other trustees are: Matt Thornton, Jan Wouters, David Crow, David Wolverton, and John Bruns. Subsequently, Pat Kurz (a professional with the Monmouth Council of Girl Scouts) was also named as a trustee.

Monmouth Council's First Eagle Scout By Dave Wolverton

The Monmouth chapter of NESA is developing a "wall of honor" to honor all Eagle Scouts at the new council service center. The NESA committee has been busy compiling a list of all local Eagle Scouts, using records from the national office as well as local records. Of course, the question of who was the *first* Eagle Scout in the council soon arose.

A common problem in databases or geneological records is "bad data." The earliest Scout in the council's Eagle Scout database was not even in a Monmouth county troop – he probably landed in the database after moving here and registering with a troop subsequent to earning the Eagle rank. The second name is probably recorded with the wrong year. The third name in the database turns out to actually be the first Eagle Scout in Monmouth Council.

His name is Roger Conant, and he was a member of Troop 17 in Red Bank. He earned the Eagle rank on March 27, 1924. The badge was presented to him in a

special investiture ceremony during a council-wide "rally" at the Red Bank Armory. He received an Eagle Scout scholarship from the Harmon Foundation, which was the first nationally awarded Eagle scholarship.

What impresses one about Roger Conant's life is what he was able to achieve from modest



beginnings with hard work. His father died when he was 12, so he grew up in a single-parent household with some help from an extended family. He took odd jobs to earn spending money. He was a counselor at Camp Burton. He developed a traveling reptile show, which led to a job at the Twin Brook Zoo in Middletown, NJ. He attended the University of Pennsylvania but was unable to complete his studies due to lack of funds (this was during the Depression). At the age of 19 he was hired to manage the reptile exhibits at the Toledo Zoo. He worked in a number of zoo positions where he was noted for bringing scientific rigor to the profession. Simultaneously, he was frequently "in the field" around the world doing research, and has well over 200 publications to his name. He eventually became the Director of the Philadelphia Zoo. After retiring from the Philadelphia Zoo, he was a professor at the University of NM.

Seven species of animals are named for Mr. Conant. He co-wrote Peterson's *Field Guide to Reptiles and Amphibians of Eastern and Central North America*. He was the President of the American Society of Icthyologists and Herpetologists. He received an honorary Doctorate from the University of Colorado and received the R. Marlin Perkins award from the American Zoo and Aquarium Association.

Of special interest to Scouts, Mr. Conant wrote the *Reptile Study* merit badge pamphlet (4 editions from 1944 to 1976). And the BSA honored him with a Gold Medal for Natural Resource Conservation – the highest-level William T. Hornaday Award – in 1999.

Mr. Conant died in his sleep on December 14, 2003 at the age of 94.

Inventorying Beginning with New PC Software

With the assistance of several kind donors, we have acquired a PC and a specialized museum database application called *PastPerfect* (see more about it at www.museumsoftware.com). This database is the same one used by the **National Scouting Museum** to track their collection.

The museum volunteers are now learning how to use the software and beginning to log the donated memorabilia into the system. It will take several months to catch up with the backlog of donations, but in the end it will be well worth the effort because we will have a great tool for researchers to easily find items in our collection.

Each and every artifact is assigned a unique ID number, similar to a Social Security number, which identifies the year the item was donated, the donor, and the specific item within a group donated items.


Kudos to the Ten Mile River Museum
